It's hard to believe that another year has come and gone already. It seems that it wasn't all that long ago that we sat down to write last year's letter. This year was a good year for our whole family, and we want to share our joy with you at this most wonderful time of year.

Eleven-year-old Teresa is now enrolled in the 6th grade. She has completely adapted to the public school setting, and is fully engaged with new friends and school activities. She has shown a real knack with music, and plays violin, clarinet, and keyboard. Teresa is an accomplished violinist with multiple skills, and even plays the viola parts on her violin in the school orchestra. That is no mean feat! Starting with the clarinet this past October, she was able to catch up with more than a year of training in just two months! In December, just a few days ago, she was admitted to the school band. She practices the clarinet and violin out of joy; she is a self-trained keyboard player. Her 5th grade academic grades were all A's making both of her parents proud. Teresa is the social extrovert and keeps involved with all sorts of social activities. In addition to being a musician, she is also an artist. During the autumn she stole the show with her pottery display featuring a human face in the form of a mime. She is currently enrolled in her sixth year of Girl Scouts, and finished her third years of 4-H (through which she entered a cat and cake in the county fair) and cheerleading. In March Teresa traveled with her Dad, Grandmas Rita and Agnes, Aunt Beverly, and cousin Jessica to New York City for a week in the 'Big Apple.' During June she traveled with her Dad to Woodstock, Illinois, to visit the new Challenger Learning Center (a smaller version of Space Camp) as the sole representative of the 57,000 fifth graders in Central Illinois. There she participated in a mission and, with her Dad, flew a \$100,000 Boeing 737 flight simulator. (Fortunately, Dad was able to land the airplane, but skidded off the runway at O'Hare International Airport.) During June Teresa spent a week at Camp Ondessonk in southern Illinois. During July she was on the road again, spending a week in Virginia with Dad and Grandma Agnes touring Civil War battlefields and the like. Early in the autumn, she participated in cheerleading camp. She now spends lots of time in chat rooms on the Internet where she continues to widen her circle of friends. As you read this, she is now in Mexico City with her sister Rebecca and Grandma Agnes.

Rebecca, too, is ever on the go. Rebecca started off the year in Mexico City. She departed for home on January 1st, and flew off two days later for three months in France. There she was enrolled in a high school in Dijon; she was hosted by the Lobry family, the family whose daughter, Fanny, stayed with us for three months last autumn. Rebecca is fluent in Spanish and French, and intent on a career in international affairs. She, like Teresa, will be in Mexico over Christmas again this year, but is staying a week longer than either Teresa or Grandma, to continue her visits with the friends and families that she knows there. Rebecca was named to Who's Who Among American High School Students for the second year. Only 1% of all the nation's students ever receive this degree of recognition. High School. She was also inducted into the National Honor Society last spring. During December she was named an Illinois State Scholar by the State of Illinois. She officially enrolled at Illinois State University this autumn, even while being a senior in high school taking a large number of advanced placement courses. During July, Rebecca spent a week at Georgetown University just outside of Washington, DC, participating in the highly acclaimed Presidential Classroom program. In the month of August she spent a week in Sucre, Bolivia, on a mission trip with the Diocese of Joliet. She served as group interpreter, and worked with children in a variety of settings – from an orphanage to a hospital.
