Teacher Information

Background Information

To write a good story, a reporter must be able to ask the right questions and then write stories to answer those questions for others.

Key Concepts and Student Information

• "5 W's" – Five main questions to answer when telling a story(Who? What? When? Where? Why? – and How?)

Materials

The 5 W's Student Sheet (1 copy per student) Newspapers with news articles Access to a television or radio (news program)

Procedure

- 1. Students should listen to a news story on the radio or watch a news story on television.
- 2. After hearing the news, students will determine the answers to the "5 W" questions based upon a news story.
- 3. Students will record the answers to the "5 W's" on the Student Sheet.

Extension Activities

Students can repeat the activity, answering the "5 W's" for several newspaper articles instead of a radio or television program.

The 5 W's

Student Sheet

A reporter's job is to get the facts. People who read the newspaper, listen to news reports or watch news programs want the basic information behind a story. Basic information can be summed up by addressing the 5 W's:

Who? What? Where? When? Why?
